1. Decennial Census Overview




U.S. Census

- Dozens of Demographic and Economic Surveys:
 - Property Owners and Managers Survey,
 Women- and Minority-Owned Business Survey,
 Census of Mineral Industries, Public Libraries
 Survey, etc ...
- Decennial Census
 - Mandated by U.S. Constitution for determining Congressional representation



The Decennial Census

- Every 10 years
- Conducted by mail and then by phone or door-to-door
- Only those who respond are counted






U.S. Census and Federal Funding

From these seven programs Massachusetts received over \$8.2 billion in FY2007 and over \$6.3 billion in FY2006.

- Medicaid
- Highway Planning and Construction
- Title I Grants to Local Education Agencies
- Foster Care
- Federal Mass Transit Grants
- Community Development Block Grants

"Hard to Count" Factors

Factors contributing to hard-to-count areas:

- Vacant units
- · Multifamily housing
- Rental housing
- Nontraditional households
- Low education levels
- High poverty
- High unemployment
- Linguistically isolated households
- Many households recently moved

3. Census 2010 Preparation



Census 2010 Timeline

Fall 2008 - Recruitment begins for local census jobs for early census operations.

Spring 2009 - Census employees go door-to-door to update address list nationwide.

Fall 2009 - Recruitment begins for census takers needed for peak workload in 2010.

February - March 2010 - Census questionnaires are mailed or delivered to households.

April 1, 2010 - Census Day

April - July 2010 - Census takers visit households that did not return questionnaire.

December 2010 - Census delivers population counts to President for apportionment.

March 2011 - Census completes delivery of redistricting data to states.


Messaging

- Message: "It's In Our Hands"
- Approach: "Ignite Mass Participation in the 2010 Census"

Timing


- Early 2009 Begin communications to target groups in 2009 (ethnic and disadvantaged groups)
- Early 2010 Begin mainstream outreach
- Census Day Peak intensity







Questionnaire Delivery



 Questionnaires delivered or mailed to all housing units in March 2010

March 8-10 Advance Letter
 March 15-17 Questionnaire
 March 22-24 Reminder Postcard

APRIL 1 CENSUS DAY

• April 1-10 Replacement Questionnaire

- Bilingual Spanish/English Questionnaires (15 million housing units in 44 states) delivered or mailed in tracts with >40% Spanish-speaking households.
- We expect a 64% mail response



Language Assistance Program

- Targeted mailing of bilingual Spanish/English questionnaire.
- Questionnaires display both English and Spanish Telephone Questionnaire Assistance (TQA) telephone numbers.
- Bilingual TQA operators available in the 5 primary non-English languages.
- Language Assistance Guides available online in 59 languages and through TQA and Questionnaire Assistance Centers (languages are listed on next screen).
- Language Identification Flashcards provided to all enumerators and Questionnaire Assistance Center Representatives.
- Be Counted forms available in 6 primary languages:
 - English
 - Spanish
 - Chinese (Simplified)
 - Korean
 - Vietnamese
 - Russian

Speaking Census

Enumeration: Data collection

"The process of interviewing people and recording the information on census forms."

Group Quarters: Dorms, jails, other institutional housing

"A group quarters is a place where people live or stay that is normally owned or managed by an entity or organization providing housing and/or services for the residents. These services may include custodial or medical care as well as other types of assistance, and residency is commonly restricted to those receiving these services. People living in group quarters are usually not related to each other. Group quarters include such places as college residence halls, residential treatment centers, skilled nursing facilities, group homes, military barracks, correctional facilities, workers' dormitories, and facilities for people experiencing homelessness."

Statistical Areas: Political (municipalities, states, counties) or Census-defined (tracts, block groups, etc) geographic areas

"A specially defined and delineated geographic entity, such as a metropolitan area, urbanized area, tribal designated statistical area, census county division, census designated place, census tract, block group, or census block, for which the Census Bureau tabulates data. Statistical entity boundaries generally are not legally defined, and designation as a statistical entity neither conveys nor confers legal ownership, entitlement, or jurisdictional authority."


Transitory Location Enumeration

- Locations include RV parks, campgrounds, hotels, motels, marinas, racetracks, circuses, and carnivals.
- Designed for people who do not have a "Usual Home Elsewhere" at time of census operations.
- Transitory locations are identified through Address Canvassing and local knowledge
- March 22 to April 16, 2010




Household Enumeration

- Nonresponse Followup (NRFU)
 - Most costly component of the census
 - Enumerators visit close to 47 million addresses
 - Multiple attempts made with households
 - 700,000 field staff hired locally in 2010
 - Multilingual enumerators
 - Late April through June 2010







Committee Types

- State
- Municipal
- Community
- Other





Municipal Committees

- Members
 - Public officials: town clerk, planner and/or GIS, others
 - Community members: Hard-to-count representatives
- Actions
 - Info: city website, newsletter, city hall
 - Special outreach to hard-to-count
 - Coordinate with local census offices
 - Census in Schools program



Local Committees

- Customized educational materials
- Assist in recruiting Census workers
- Outreach through trusted outlets
- Educate community about local Questionnaire Assistance Centers and Be Counted sites



Complete Count Committee & Census in Schools

- Complete Count Committees
 - Local leaders with knowledge of community and hard-to-count populations
 - Create and implement local outreach strategy to maximize participation
- Census in Schools
 - K-12 lesson plans, teaching materials
 - Only some Census 2010 materials available
